Dr. Victor Chang AC

Dr. Victor Chang was born 21 November 1936, in Shanghai. He was a Chinese-Australian cardiac surgeon who was a pioneer in heart transplant surgery and research. He established the National Heart Transplant Program in 1984 and the National Lung transplant program in 1990. Dr. Chang played a key role in the development of an artificial heart valve and, in later years, an artificial heart. He performed the first Heart/Lung transplant in 1986 and on 8 April 1984, Dr. Chang and his team operated on 14-year-old Fiona Coote, Australia's youngest transplant patient. He was awarded the Order of Australia medal in 1986 in recognition of 'service to international relations between Australia and China and to medical science'. The Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute was established in New South Wales on 23 November 1993 in honor of Dr. Chang.




Adam Goodes

Adam Goodes was born 8 January 1980, in South Australia. Goodes' father is of English, Irish, and Scottish ancestry and his mother is an Indigenous Australian. He was drafted by the Sydney Swans in 1997 at the age of 17. Adam has gone on to achieve the most recognised individual and team awards in the AFL, winning both the Brownlow Medal and Premiership Cup twice. In September 2009 he colaunched the Goodes/O'Loughlin (GO) Foundation to provide indigenous children with scholarships to quality schools and to assist families in meeting the expenses for students attending these schools. In 2014, he was named Australian of the Year for his community work through the "GO Foundation" and his advocacy against racism.




Layne Beachley

Layne Beachley was born 24 May 1972, with the birth name of Tania Gardner, before being adopted by the Beachley family. She became a professional surfer at the age of 16 and was the first woman in history to gain 7 World Championships, six of them consecutive, 1998 - 2003 and 2006. In 2006, she was inducted into the Surfing Hall of Fame and in 2011 into the Sport Australia Hall of Fame. Layne was the founder of the 'Aim for the Stars Foundation' whose slogan is "We aim to empower individuals to take control of their lives, to invest in their future and fulfill their potential. We support girls and women with initiative and passion, that are committed to achieving a dream and courageous enough to ask for help along the way."



Jane and Glenn McGrath

The McGrath Foundation raises money to place Breast Care Nurses in communities right across Australia, as well as increasing breast cancer awareness among young Australian women. Jane McGrath was married to the famous fast bowler Glenn McGrath, who led the Australian bowling attack for over 10 years and holds the record for the most wickets taken by an Australian fast bowler. Following her personal experience with breast cancer and receiving support from a trained breast care nurse, Jane McGrath launched the McGrath Foundation in 2005. The McGrath Foundation is symbolically associated with the color pink. It is supported by the Sydney Pink Test and the AFL Pink Lady spectacle, where breast cancer patients and survivors stand on the MCG as a sign of solidarity for those who face this illness.



James 'Jim' Stynes

Jim Stynes was born on 23 April 1966 in Dublin, Ireland. A promising Gaelic footballer, Jim moved to Australia at the age of 18 where he played 264 AFL games for the Melbourne Football Club, including 244 consecutive games. In 1994, Jim Stynes co-founded The Reach Foundation and became a prominent youth worker in Victoria. The Reach Foundation's vision is that every young person has the support and self-belief they need to fulfill their potential and dare to dream. Their mission in achieving this is to encourage young people, no matter what their circumstances, to believe they can achieve. Jim was named the Victorian of the Year in 2001 and 2003 for his work with the Reach Foundation. He received an Order of Australia Medal in 2007. Jim Stynes passed away from cancer on 20 March 2012 aged 45.



Dr. Fiona Wood

Dr. Fiona Wood was born on 2 February 1958 in Yorkshire, England, and migrated to Australia in 1987. She is the Director of the Burn Service of Western Australia and a Consultant at Royal Perth Hospital and Princess Margaret Hospital in Perth. In October 2002, Dr. Wood and her team worked to save 28 patients suffering from burns, deadly infections, and delayed shock from the Bali Bombings. Fiona Wood received an Order of Australia medal in 2003, Australian of the Year, and Western Australian Citizen of the Year. Fiona's dedication to the Australian people and her love of working and living in Australia is reflected in her many medical achievements. Fiona is a permanent resident of Australia, the mother of six children, loves sport, and is immensely proud to be Australian. Fiona works towards a society dependent on the integrity of each and every one of us.

PRIMARY YEARS UNIFORM GUIDE

As a member of Hazel Glen College, each student projects the College's image, especially in the way they present themselves in their dress and behaviour. This should reflect their status as a member of a respected College in the community. Primary years students are expected to dress neatly and in the correct College uniform as is appropriate for the weather.

FOOTWEAR

Students must be wearing shoes that are completely black (no other colours). These can be school shoes or runners with black laces (no basketball or skate style shoes, i.e. converse or vans).

On days where they have their Physical Education (PE) class, please ensure your child is wearing appropriate runners (no skate/van/basketball style shoes), or have runners in their bag to change into.

ACCESSORIES

- HGC Backpack with Laptop Insert
- HGC Bucket Hat must be worn Terms 1 and 4 (no cap)
- HGC Book Bag
- Tights (black)
- Black Scarf Only (no other colours permitted; no prints or logos)
- Hair accessories (e.g. hair ties, scrunchies, ribbons) must be College colours (including religious headwear)

SECONDARY YEARS UNIFORM GUIDE

The College uniform is expected to be worn with pride and care. To ensure this happens:

- The Uniform Guidelines apply during school hours, while travelling to and from Hazel Glen, and when students are on school events or representing the College;
- Students are expected to dress neatly and in the correct college uniform;
- Primary School Wear (PSW) are the current uniform supplier and are available online (www.psw.com.au);
- We encourage all uniform items must be clearly labelled with the student's name; any items are the responsibility of the child and child's family;
- Jewellery: the only acceptable jewellery items are watches, small stud earrings/sleepers worn in the ears only and nose piercings must be a small stud/clear discreet keeper;
- Extreme hair colours (e.g. green or purple) and/or extreme hair styles (e.g. spikes or shaved head patterns) are not permitted. If in the College opinion it is unacceptable, it may result in the student's exclusion until the matter is satisfactorily resolved;
- Students with long hair are encouraged to keep it tied back for health and safety reasons and in support of the prevention of Head Lice;
- All hair accessories should conform to the College colours (including religious headwear);
- · Nail polish and cosmetics may not be worn;
- The prescribed Hazel Glen bucket hat must be worn during Term 1 and Term 4 and on any other day prescribed by the school. Hazel Glen College beanies with a logo may be worn in cold weather. Hats are not to be worn inside;
- College Council requires the Principal to be responsible for implementation of the Uniform Policy in a manner consistent with the Student Dress Code;
- Students not wearing the prescribed uniform will be issued an 'Out of School Uniform' notification that will be sent home to parents/guardians;
- Parents seeking exemptions to the Dress Code due to religious beliefs, ethnic or cultural background, student disability, health condition or economic hardship must apply in writing to the Principal for consideration.

Decisions as to the suitability of any uniform item is made by the Head of Year level in conjunction with an Assistant Principal.

ADMINISTRATION AND FEE STRUCTURE

STUDENT ABSENCES

When your child is absent from school, it is your responsibility to contact the school either by phone or through the Compass app. This also applies to late arrivals, who must be signed in at the Primary Years Office.

PAYMENTS

Hazel Glen College offers a range of items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides in order to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis. Any extra—curricular items or activities will be published on Compass in a timely manner, with payment plan options available.

DIGITAL BUNDLE

To support the learning of the students, all additional apps will be made available from the College servers. This will make it easier for parents to provide the necessary learning tools for their children and for teachers to work seamlessly with their classes. Importantly, it will allow the students to learn without technical barriers. The digital bundle is itemised and will be sent out during the commencement of the new year via Compass as an event with relevant charges listed. Please note, your child will not receive access to the digital bundle until this payment has been made.

CAMPING PROGRAM

CAMP

Our camping program fosters a love of recreation and outdoors by providing opportunities for students to be independent and to gain an understanding of the natural environment and their responsibilities within it. It develops positive relationships and community spirit outside the College setting.

Our program commences in Prep and continues with new opportunities as students progress through the Primary Years. These include:

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

STUDENT LEADERSHIP ACADEMY (SLA)

The Hazel Glen College Student Leadership Academy has been developed to provide students with the necessary skills, knowledge, and experiences to become effective leaders in the college, communities, and beyond.

The goal of the Student Leadership Academy is to help students develop leadership qualities such as critical thinking, problem solving, communication, teamwork, and decision-making skills. Academy students are offered a range of opportunities through teacher-led fortnightly classes, workshops, and excursions.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Stage 1

• Students will write an application to the academy leader explaining why they would like to be a part of the academy.

Stage 2

• A select number of students will be invited to a group interview, where they will present themselves as well as a school initiative they would like to develop.

STUDENT AWARDS

Hazel Glen Heroes are presented at Year Level Assemblies on a fortnightly basis and are awarded to students who have demonstrated our College values.



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INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC ACADEMY (IMA)

OUR VISION

The Hazel Glen College Instrumental Music Academy (IMA) has been established to identify and develop emerging student musicians across all facets and disciplines of instrumental music. The Academy's holistic approach aims to develop the student musicians to better prepare individuals for pathways into a professional setting by supporting them to balance their academics, develop their leadership skills, and support them to become global citizens.

OUR MISSION

- To promote a high-performance culture that provides student musicians the skills to be successful and foster a love for music
- To develop, enhance, and prepare students for pathway opportunities into professional settings
- To assist student musicians to balance their academic and instrumental goals and develop mental and technical skills that will support them to achieve and reach their potential

STRUCTURE

Students will participate in 3x60 minute sessions per week that are a combination of timetabled, instrumental, and after-school classes. Student musicians will follow a high-performance curriculum that will further deepen and support their musical success in and out of the classroom. The Instrumental Music Academy is a 2-year program for student musicians and requires a 2-year commitment.

STUDENT MUSICIAN CRITERIA

The Academy will have 25 positions available for Year 5 and 25 positions for Year 6 students in 2024. Due to the limited number of places we can offer in the Academy, applicants will undergo a rigorous selection process whereby successful applicants must meet the selection criteria and demonstrate the below attributes:

- A committed mindset of ongoing development and improvement
- The physical, mental and emotional willingness to undertake a challenging and rigorous program
- A passion and commitment to work hard, to be challenged, and a motivation to challenge themselves
- The ability to work as part of a team as well as a demonstration of leadership skills

PRIMARY YEARS TIMETABLE

Hazel Glen College operates on a ten-day/fortnightly timetable, this means that students will have subjects at different times from one week to the next. These weeks are referred to as Week A and Week B – teachers will make timetables available.

ORGANISATION

DAILY ORGANISATION

The doors open at 8:33am for students to bring in their bags and get organised for the day. It's an important time for teachers to spend with their students to assist them to settle and feel safe and happy at school. The morning is an important opportunity for building teacher and student relationships. We ask parents who need to speak to their child's teacher to contact your child's teacher via email, by phone, or book an appointment to meet with them.

A bell will ring at 8:45am to indicate the beginning of learning time. The teacher will assist the students to become familiar with this routine. It is extremely important that students develop good habits of punctuality and regular attendance, as well as a positive attitude towards school. Don't underestimate your role in developing these attitudes.

Student absences require an explanatory note from parents. Absences must be recorded via the Compass app. Late arrivals must attend the Primary Years office to be signed in.

At the beginning of the year, we ask that students bring a box of tissues. Each day students are required to bring:

- Water Bottle
- Lunch Box (Brain Food, Recess and Lunch)
- Notice Bag (including take-home books and Student Diary)
- iPad (battery fully charged)

BRAIN FOOD

At 9:45am each day, students take a short break from their classroom activity to allow them to snack on a small piece of vegetable, fruit, or cheese. This snack should be sent along in your child's lunchbox and should be easy to eat quickly.



The Student Diary is itemised in parent payment contributions. It has been designed by our dedicated staff to cater for our specific needs. This means that it includes information carefully selected to support the Hazel Glen College community.

The Hazel Glen College Student Diary is required to log at-home learning, weekly timetables, and organise weekly activities.

FOOD AT SCHOOL

We ask that students are supported with healthy food which will provide them with the required amount of energy for the day. As some students are sensitive or allergic to certain foods, we request families to please consider others when selecting foods for their child.

CANTEEN

Lunch orders will be completed through our online system called 'Munch Monitor'. Student monitors will collect the lunch orders in time for Lunch Eating Time at 1:15 pm on canteen days.

TECHNOLOGY

Hazel Glen College incorporates the use of technology in every area of the curriculum. Students use their devices in many ways, including reviewing their timetables, receiving learning material customised to their classes, participating in collaborative projects and submitting work to their teachers.

• Students from Prep to Year 6 use an iPad for their everyday classroom learning.

An appropriate piece of technology is required as it is an essential part of our student's learning journey. Students require a variety of apps on their devices to assist in their learning. Apps are used to create assignments and assist in the consumption and communication of information. Therefore, it is essential to have the required applications installed on devices. In this way, students are responsible for and in control of their learning at HGC.

COMPASS

Compass is a school management platform where parents can engage in their child's learning.

Families have one place where they can do everything. From lodging late/absentee notices, reading reports, contacting teachers, signing permission slips, ordering school photographs, making payments, booking Parent Teacher conferences and many more services that will be available to you.

The program is available on all devices with apps available for Apple and Android devices. We have Compass terminals in the main entrance locations to the College to allow additional access.
